MUSEUM AND CITY REACH AGREEMENT

GOOD NEWS - the DREAM of finding a permanent location for the Cedar Hill Museum of History is on the horizon. On December 10, 2019, the Cedar Hill City Council unanimously approved a Memorandum of Understanding to reserve space in the future Cedar Hill library for the Cedar Hill Museum of History (Museum). The 2017 Bond Election presented an opportunity for the City to partner with the Museum. The Memorandum of Understanding authorizes 2,500, dedicated, square feet of space for the Museum. The Museum would have access to the lobby, restrooms and other common spaces in the library. With the common areas, the Museum would have access to approximately 3,000 square feet of space.

While the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is not a formal agreement, it declares the City's intent to enter into a future lease agreement with the Museum. Mayor Stephen Mason and Council Member Daniel Haydin were instrumental in working toward a partnership with the Museum. Members of the Museum are encouraged to express personal appreciation to all the City Council members for supporting the Museum.

The City appointed Museum Board President Karen Aruda and Museum Trustee Linda Patton to represent the Museum on the Library Design Committee.

BOARD PRESIDENT KAREN ARUDA AND BOARD TREASURER GERI KLAUCK



KAREN ARUDA has served as president of the Cedar Hill Museum of History since 2018. She grew up in Grand Prairie, Texas. Karen and her husband, Paul, and their two sons moved to Cedar Hill in 1976. She retired after 55 years as a hairdresser. Karen loves history and joined the Cedar Hill Historical Society in 2004. She previously served as president of the Cedar Hill Museum of History from 2011 through 2013. Karen devotes a lot of time volunteering with the Museum to preserve Cedar Hill history.



GERI KLAUCK is the treasurer of the Cedar Hill Museum of History. She has a Bachelor's degree in accounting and worked for many years as an accountant, accounting manager and controller. Geri has been a volunteer at genealogical societies since 1997, a docent at Dogwood Canyon Audubon Center from 2011 through 2018. She also served as the treasurer of the Cedar Hill Genealogical Society and is currently its president. Geri is an avid genealogical and family history researcher and enjoys working puzzles and reading mystery novels.

MORE VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Karen and Geri welcome and encourage other members who can spare an hour or two on Monday or Wednesday (or both) to come by and lend a helping hand at the Museum office. There are many projects for volunteers such as organizing files, sorting and identifying photos and performing other tasks. The Museum also needs help with fundraising projects.

HISTORIC CRAWFORD'S TORNADO GRAVEYARD

The Museum serves as caretaker of Crawford's Tornado Graveyard, located on private property in the vicinity of North Cedar Hill Road and Pioneer Trail in Cedar Hill.

Robert Crawford and a group of associates settled in Cedar Hill in 1852 to establish a church for the Methodist Episcopal Church South. Crawford was a school teacher and trustee of the first church, known as the Cedar Mountain Church. He owned land adjacent to the Church's property.

On April 29, 1856, a ferocious and deadly tornado ripped through the village of Cedar Hill, killing nine people and destroying the Church and all but two structures in the village. After the tornado, Crawford deeded four acres of land to the Methodist Church "to the public indiscriminately for burying their dead." Most of the victims of the 1856 tornado are buried in the Graveyard, including one African-American woman, which made this the first integrated graveyard in southwest Dallas County, Texas.

The location of the burial ground was lost to history for over 100 years. In 2002, Wanda Stanton Pitt, a member of the Cedar Hill Historical Society, began researching deed records to try to locate the Graveyard. With permission from the property owners, members of the Cedar Hill Historical Society searched through the thick woods and undergrowth and rediscovered the lost Graveyard on January 21, 2005.

In 2006, the Texas Historical Commission designated the site an Historic Texas Cemetery. The graveyard was reconsecrated in a blessing ceremony on October 7, 2011. A Texas Historical Marker was placed on the site on April 29, 2012, the 156th anniversary of the tornado, in a ceremony sponsored by the Cedar Hill Museum of History. The City of Cedar Hill also designated the Graveyard as a Cedar Hill Historic Property.

Once a year, Museum volunteers clean the Graveyard during the winter before new vegetation starts growing.


